

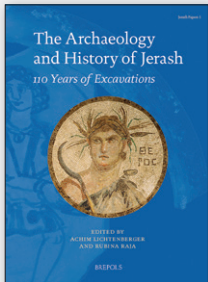

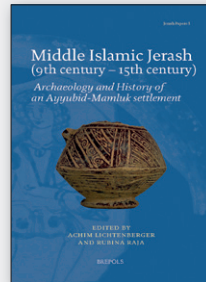


The Archaeology and History of Jerash 110 Years of Excavations

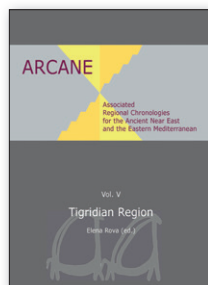
At the Northern Frontier of Near Eastern Archaeology Recent Research on Caucasia and Anatolia in the Bronze Age

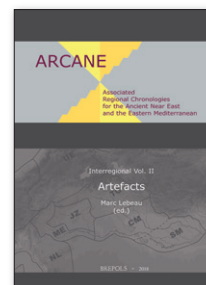

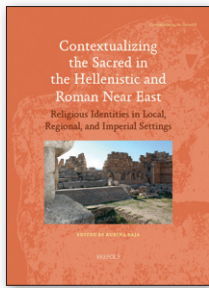


Arcane Interregional Artefacts

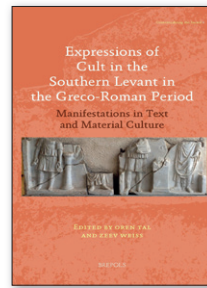

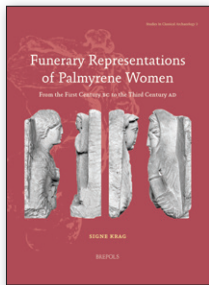

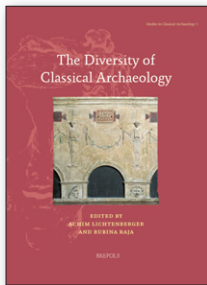


Funerary Representations of Palmyrene Women

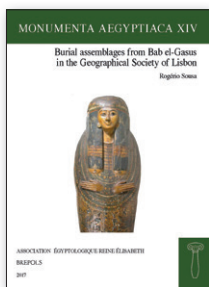

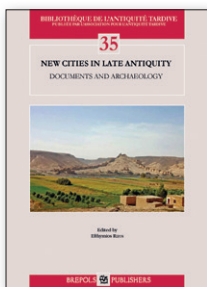


Burial assemblages from Bab el-Gasus in the Geographical Society of Lisbon
