LANGUAGES

The Journal publishes articles in English, French, German, Italian, Russian, Spanish.

MANUSCRIPT SUBMISSION

Submission of a manuscript implies: that the work described has not been published before; that it is not under consideration for publication anywhere else; that its publication has been approved by all co-authors, as well as by the responsible authorities – tacitly or explicitly – at the institute where the work has been carried out. The publisher will not be held legally responsible should there be any claims for compensation.

Authors wishing to include figures, tables, or text passages that have already been published elsewhere or that reproduce ancient documents are required to obtain permission from the copyright owner(s) for both the print and online format and to include evidence that such permission has been granted when submitting their papers. Any material received without such evidence will be assumed to originate from the authors.

Papers submitted to *AIHS* undergo a double-blind refereeing. Authors should send their manuscript in two versions : one “blinded,” one not. Make sure that the file names you give to each version contain the expression “blinded” or “not blinded,” respectively.

TITLE PAGE

The title page should include: The name(s) of the author(s), The title of the paper, The affiliation(s) and address(es) of the author(s), The e-mail address and telephone number of the corresponding author.

ABSTRACT

All papers should include an abstract in English of 150-200 words.

FOOTNOTES

Footnotes should be used instead of endnotes. Footnotes should be numbered consecutively throughout the text.

REFERENCES

General remarks

- Authors are responsible for the completeness and accuracy of their references and citations.
- References should include complete page numbers for all articles in journals and edited volumes.
- The numbers of page or folio must be introduced by “p.” or “f.” or “f. sign.” (not “pp.”/”ff.”) both in the reference list at the end of the paper and in-text citations.

References in footnotes

- References to books should include author's family name, title of the book in italics (in an abbreviated form if it is more than 5 words), year of publication, page numbers to which the reference refers. *Example:* Nicolaïdis (ed.), *Greek Alchemy*, 2018, p. 15 ; Malpangotto & al. (eds.), *L'homme au risque de l'infini*, 2013, p. 171.

- References to articles in journals or collected papers should include authors' family names, title of the article in quotes (in an abbreviated form if it is more than 5 words), year, number of particular pages cited. *Example:* Robin, « Faux soleils, vraie science », 2017, p. 67; Guicciardini, « Une note sur Newton »; 2013, p. 171.

- In the case of books or papers with two authors, both the family names will appear being separated by a comma ; in case of more than 3 authors, only the family name of the first author will appear followed by ‘& al.’.

- In case of multiple titles of the same author,, the name of the author will be followed by the list of titles and years of publication separated by *and*. *Example : Name, Title1, Year1 and Title2, Year2.*

REFERENCE LIST

Each article must be followed by the list of references placed on a new page at the end of the text and headed by “References”. It should only include works that are cited in the text.

- The list should be in alphabetical order by the last name of the first author of each work.

- More than one reference by the same author should be listed in chronological order.

- Complete family name will be followed by the initial of the name. If there are more than one author, a comma will separate them.

- Books should include authors’ family names followed by the initial of the name, complete title of the book in italics, place of publication, publisher, year of publication. *Example: Nicolaïdis, E. (ed.), Greek Alchemy from Late Antiquity to Early Modernity, Turnhout, Brepols, 2018 ; Malpangotto M., Jullien, V., Nicolaïdis E. (eds.), L’homme au risque de l’infini. Mélanges d’histoire et philosophie des sciences offerts à Michel Blay, Turnhout, Brepols, 2013.*

- Articles in journals or collected papers should include authors’ family names and the initial of the name, title of the article in quotes, complete title of the periodical in italics, number of issue, year, pages. *Example: Robin J. L., « Faux soleils, vraie science. Les parhélies et la genèse du cartésianisme », Archives internationales d’histoire des sciences, 67/178, 2017, p. 65-74 ; Guicciardini N., « Une note sur Newton et la tradition néo-pythagoricienne », L’homme au risque de l’infini, Malpangotto M., Jullien V., Nicolaïdis E. (eds.), Turnhout, Brepols, 2013, p. 169-175.*

- Reprints and Translations
