Throughout history, law and literature have always been in constant dialogue, sharing significant connections and exerting mutual influences. Both are artificial creations, products of human imagination that use language and metaphors to build meanings and shape the world around us. In the Middle Ages, the proximity of these two genres is even more pronounced. This is not only because many literary figures were also jurists, but also because medieval legal texts can be classified as a distinct literary genre known as 'legal literature'. Additionally, medieval jurists did not hesitate to draw upon literary texts, understood as genuine sources of law ('auctoritates morales'), to fill gaps in their legal knowledge.

Political Thought and Eleventh-Century Populism

The Meek, the Many, and the Meritorious during the Age of the Gregorian Reform

Jason MacLeod


The first comprehensive study to analyse the eleventh century populist movements in the context of medieval political thought, revealing the earliest textual basis of political power – for those inherently disempowered by lack of noble birth, wealth, or education – in medieval political thought.

The populist movements of the eleventh century (the Peace of God, Gregorian Reform, and the First Crusade) did not simply mark an important pivot in the greater history of the West. Taken together, they also represent a fascinating phenomenon unto themselves. R. I. Moore characterized them as the products of a 'bizarre but temporarily effective' alliance of the clergy and people, while Richard Landes and Thomas Head claimed that they heralded the 'emergence of the crowd on the stage of European affairs.' This book is the first comprehensive study to consider the textual records of that alliance/emergence from an intellectual perspective. Through an in-depth analysis of ten eleventh-century writers, the author Jason MacLeod argues that a distinctive strand of political thought entwines its way through the textual legacy of these movements.

Jason MacLeod earned his Ph.D. in European History at Boston University in 2024, with a focus on medieval political thought and the history of the medieval church. He earned his master's degree in military history at Norwich University in 2010.

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

Du palais impérial de Constantinople au rayonnement feutré de la bibliothèque municipale de Tours, en passant par Chypre, la Provence et Paris, le manuscrit *Turonensis* 980 traverse les siècles, les lieux et les cultures. Commandé au X^e siècle par l'empereur byzantin Constantin VII Porphyrogénète, ce volume d'encyclopédie impériale — probablement issu de la prestigieuse bibliothèque de la cour — a connu un destin aussi singulier que fascinant.

Dépasant la seule étude d'un manuscrit, ce volume interroge les liens multiples entre pouvoir, savoir et mémoire écrite dans l'espace méditerranéen. Il rend hommage à ceux qui, hier comme aujourd'hui, ont contribué à sa transmission.

Anne-Marie Cheny, maîtresse de conférences à l'Université Rouen Normandie (GRHis), explore la réception de Byzance dans l'érudition moderne, en particulier à travers la figure de Peiresc. Elle travaille notamment sur la naissance des études byzantines comme discipline.

Philippe Trélat, chercheur-associé au GRHis et secrétaire du Centre d'Études Chypriotes, est spécialiste de l'histoire urbaine de l'Orient latin, notamment du royaume de Chypre. Il a consacré sa thèse à la capitale Nicosie aux XII^e-XV^e siècles.



This book honours the achievements of Marco Mostert, professor of Medieval History at Utrecht University. Marco has been one of the main promoters and proponents of the expanding field of studies in medieval literacy and orality. The book celebrates his legacy by focusing on communication and writing in the Middle Ages, themes central to Marco's interest. It is divided into two sections.


Part I covers the early medieval period, focusing on manuscripts and texts, mainly those produced by clerics. Articles in this section includes studies on the liturgical hymn *Te Deum*; Carolingian political hegemony in Frisia; a new Carolingian witness of Suetonius's *Life of Caesars*; the Utrecht Psalter and its historical context; monastic socialization; political communication through sermons; manuscript annotations at Fleury-sur-Loire; Ademar of Chabannes's final years; and the semantic field of *communicatio*.

Part II shifts focus to written communication in broader societal layers in the later medieval period, when writing became significant for other societal groups like townsfolk and peasants. Articles in this section discuss a case of identifying a thief through written documents; urban literacy in Danish and Hungarian towns; graffiti in Abruzzi churches; the cartulary of Egmond monastery; and literate culture among late medieval countryside inhabitants.

Friends, collaborators, colleagues, and former students of Marco have contributed to this volume, with all authors discussing different aspects of the use of the written word in various parts of the medieval European world. The result is a book with multiple facets, collectively contribute to a deeper understanding of medieval literacy and its societal implications.



Founded in 1945 by P.O. Kristeller, the *Catalogus Translationum et Commentariorum* has evolved over time to reflect developments in the field of reception studies; each article begins with an overview of a Greek or Latin author's reception and contains detailed and accurate information about manuscripts and early printed editions along with copious quotations of paratextual material. Volume 14 is dedicated to the vast literary production of a single Greek author, the Syrian-born satirist Lucian of Samosata. The highly original and often surprising texts of Lucian have inspired a rich tradition of translations, commentaries, and studies throughout the centuries.

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Crossroads of Cultures

Multilingual Diversity in Dutch Literature from Late Medieval Flanders



This volume follows the traces of multilingualism in medieval Flanders and tells the story of how Dutch, French and Latin interacted in a diverse range of texts and manuscripts from this multicultural region.

Located in the geographical region where the Low Countries, the Holy German Empire, and the French Kingdom converge, the medieval County of Flanders was a crossroad at which many cultures from across Europe met. As these cultures mixed, so too did their languages, leading to Flanders becoming profoundly multilingual, both on a societal and individual level. This volume examines the literary interaction between the most prominent languages of Flanders, namely Dutch, French, and Latin, in a variety of texts and manuscripts from an array of genres, analyzing multilingualism as a cultural phenomenon, a sociolinguistic feature, and a literary device. Combining literary studies with insights from sociolinguistics, material philology, and translation studies, this work illustrates the rich multilingual diversity of medieval Flemish literature during the late Middle Ages and promotes the study of Dutch literature in a translingual, multicultural context.

Jelmar Hugen (1992) studied Dutch Literature and Medieval Studies at Leiden University (BA) and Utrecht University (RMA), during which period he also spent time abroad at Cambridge University and Harvard University. In 2018, he started his PhD at Utrecht University, which considers the multilingual diversity of medieval Flemish literature. This research took place in the NWO-funded research project *The Multilingual Dynamics of the Literary Culture of Medieval Flanders (ca 1200 – ca 1500)*. He is currently a postdoctoral researcher at Leiden University, working on multilingual networks of lyrical literature in medieval Brabant.

Une expérience communale

Société et culture politique à Marseille entre XII^e et XIII^e siècle

Giovanni Ziggotto

La trajectoire socio-institutionnelle d'une commune maritime inscrite dans les dynamiques institutionnelles et les pratiques sociales de la Provence des XII^e et XIII^e siècles.

L'historiographie des communes médiévales méridionales a peiné, jusqu'à une époque récente, à s'affirmer en dehors du cadre d'analyse de l'Italie centro-septentrionale des XII^e et XIII^e siècles. Pourtant, durant ces deux siècles, la Provence urbaine constitua un espace géographique et un horizon culturel particulièrement propice à un plein développement et à un usage conscient des institutions politiques et des langages sociaux qui furent propres à la civilisation communale médiévale.

À partir du cas d'étude de Marseille, la plus importante ville provençale d'époque médiévale et l'un des ports méditerranéens les plus dynamiques du XIII^e siècle, l'objet de cette recherche est de poser à nouveaux frais la question des structures socio-politiques des communes médiévales, en plaçant au centre de la démarche l'étude de la société citadine en elle-même ainsi que celle de la culture politique que cette société promut. Se démarquant de l'ancienne tradition interprétative visant à réduire l'importance des villes dans le contexte du Moyen Âge français, au profit du prestige accordé à la formation de l'État central, une nouvelle approche de « l'expérience communale » marseillaise est ainsi proposée, réévaluant en particulier la culture politique originale qui sous-tendit cette expérience.

Le livre entend ainsi souligner l'importance des dynamiques socio-institutionnelles et socio-politiques pour comprendre la nature, les adaptations locales et l'évolution historique de la matrice culturelle des communes médiévales.

Docteur en histoire médiévale, **Giovanni Ziggotto** est ATER en histoire médiévale à l'Université d'Aix-Marseille et chercheur associé au laboratoire TELEMME (UMR 7303 Aix-Marseille Université/Cnrs). Ses recherches s'articulent autour de l'histoire des sociétés urbaines, des institutions communales et de la culture politique en Provence médiévale et notamment à Marseille.

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


The volume examines the agency of Latin, Byzantine and Muslim travellers to the production of politics, space and cultural memory in the eastern Mediterranean during the Late Middle Ages.

Travel and mobility for political, military, economic, religious, and intellectual purposes were crucial in shaping the medieval eastern Mediterranean through the interaction of travellers with the diverse cultures of the region (Latin, Muslim, Byzantine, etc.). This volume aims to shed light on the agency of travellers to create politics, space, and cultural memory in the period c. 1300 to c. 1500, an era in which transcultural contact in the Eastern Mediterranean world was reshaped through developments such as the Ottoman expansion, while new conceptual tools of the Renaissance period allowed both individuals and communities to be perceived and described in different ways.

Bringing together case-studies of travel accounts and other relevant texts by authors with differing backgrounds and wide-ranging life experiences, this volume aims to shed light on this aspect of cultural history through the exploration of four key themes: individuality and the shaping of the self as traveller and author; the production of space, in particular via critical engagement with the modern analytical tools of orientalism and colonialism in medieval studies; the intersections of these themes with the activities of pilgrims and merchants; and the way on which travellers and their narratives interacted with both their own and foreign communities. This approach offers fresh insights in our understanding of mobility, identity, and cultural interaction in the late medieval eastern Mediterranean.


This volume explores the material and symbolic importance that buildings played in the context of conflicts that emerged as social and political affiliations and identities, especially local, were defined with new force.

The four-volume sub-series 'Petrifying Wealth' explores the sudden ubiquity of masonry construction between 1050 and 1300 in Southern Europe and its profound effect on the European landscape. New questions about wealth, society, and medieval building are explored, which highlight the link between construction in durable materials and the shaping of individual, collective, and territorial identities: the birth of a new, long-lasting panorama, epitomising the way we see the space and territory of Europe today.

In the central Middle Ages, when the roots of power and social identities were defined with new force and, first and foremost, at the local level, conflict became one of the most important factors that drove the building of durable constructions. Buildings and conflicts were linked more closely than before. This third volume in the 'Petrifying Wealth' series explores the material and symbolic importance that buildings played in the context of clashes of various kinds: between bishops and city communities; between people marked by different religious affiliations; between lords; between lords and subjects; between different visions of the ecclesiastical hierarchy; between sovereigns, city communities, and the nobility; and between families and members of the same kinship.



Au cours du XII^e siècle, les quatre premières filles de Cîteaux (traditionnellement reconnues, en tenant compte des travaux récents sur Preuilley peut-être fondée en 1116), fondées entre 1113 et 1117, ont eu des pratiques communes, à savoir un réel empressement à obtenir des écrits pour préserver la mémoire de leurs acquisitions accompagné d'un souci constant de conservation de leurs originaux, la rédaction d'une grande majorité de leurs actes par leurs *scriptoria* respectifs, une forte tendance à se tourner vers les évêques pour notifier et/ou confirmer leurs documents. Si le recours aux pancartes est une pratique courante, presque une routine, à La Ferté, Clairvaux et Morimond pour toute la période, à Pontigny en revanche un autre choix a été fait en mettant en chantier dès les années 1160 un premier cartulaire. Ces dissemblances sont liées non seulement à la structure différente des acquisitions faites par les monastères entre, d'une part, les trois premiers qui ont vu grossir leurs patrimoines par l'entrée d'une multitude de biens de petite taille et, d'autre part, Pontigny qui a acquis des terres de plus grandes dimensions, mais aussi aux usages des diocèses dans lesquels ils sont implantés. Celui d'Auxerre en effet ne semble pas avoir eu recours aux pancartes alors que la pratique s'est développée dans ceux de Langres, de Toul, de Chalon ou encore de Besançon, notamment pour notifier les biens acquis par les ordres nouveaux, cisterciens comme prémontrés. Dans ces conditions, ces quatre abbayes sont à la fois des réceptrices d'usages extérieurs qu'elles adaptent à leurs besoins et des productrices de solutions innovantes pour traiter la documentation reçue.

Marlène Helias-Baron est ingénieure de recherche en analyse de sources à l'Institut de recherche et d'histoire des textes (IRHT-UPR 841). Elle a soutenu en 2005, sous la direction de Michel Parisse, une thèse consacrée à la diplomatie cistercienne au XII^e siècle et plus particulièrement aux pratiques de l'écrit de La Ferté, Pontigny, Clairvaux et Morimond. Elle travaille sur les manuscrits médiévaux, les livres d'archives, les écritures anciennes et leur exploitation par des outils numériques.

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
Anti-Jewish Greek Texts in Late Medieval Crete

The Case of Manouel Savios and Angelos Gregorios

Eleftherios Despotakis

The present study explores Greek anti-Jewish writings in Venetian Crete within a framework of Christian-Jewish coexistence. Although Jews were economically and socially integrated, they encountered stereotypes and episodic violence grounded in inherited religious prejudice. Unlike Byzantium, Crete produced no systematic anti-Jewish polemic; hostile views surfaced sporadically in vernacular and didactic texts. Ecclesiastical conflicts among Orthodox, Catholics, and unionists eclipsed Jewish participation. In such a limited circulation of manuscripts of anti-Jewish content in late Venetian Crete, the texts of Manouel Savios and Angelos Gregorios constitute an exception.

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

Crossing Rivers in Byzantium and Beyond

Rivers are essential elements of nature that shape the physical landscape and the way of life of people in their surroundings. They define territories and boundaries, separating and connecting in a real and a figurative sense. The crossing of rivers with man-made devices such as fords, rafts, ferries and bridges of various materials demonstrates the dominion of humankind over nature and provides advantages in many areas of human life: social, economic, military. The physical appearance and the effort to construct crossings have granted them symbolic meaning, ranging from triumphal monuments visualizing the conquest of a river and expansion of state territory to places of transition defining a space between opposed worlds.

In order to investigate for the first time the peculiarities of river crossings in the Byzantine empire, the present volume places them in a broad chronological and geographical context. It includes sixteen papers by established and emerging scholars from various European academic institutions and multiple disciplines, stretching chronologically from Late Antiquity to the 16th century and geographically from Jordan to Great Britain. Based on an interdisciplinary discourse the volume shows different aspects of the Byzantine world that bring us further in our understanding of Byzantium.

Galina Fingarova is currently a Guest Professor in Byzantine art and archaeology at the University of Ioannina. She has recently completed her project on 'Byzantine Stone Bridges: Material Evidence and Cultural Meanings' which was awarded four international fellowships and will be featured in a forthcoming monograph.

Andreas Külzer is a member of the long-term project Tabula Imperii Byzantini at the Austrian Academy of Sciences in Vienna and the responsible leader for the research domain Anatolia. He is Corresponding Member of the German Archaeological Institute and adjunct professor for Byzantine Studies at the University of Cologne.

In some cases, their proposals were formulated on the substratum of Roman antiquity, often reinterpreted. Furthermore, special attention is given to the memorial competencies of devices and liturgical furnishings, that constituted a large part of the visual and mnemonic experience inside their ceremonial spaces.

The Loggia in Italian Communes

Architecture and Visual Regimes in Late Medieval Republics



From the 11th century onwards, loggias put the new life-world of self-governing communes in Italy on view for a savvy public, showcasing leading citizens engaged in activities which, for the times, were ethically cutting-edge; in so doing, these deceptively simple buildings helped advance progressive attitudes toward commerce, sociability, and self-rule before the dawn of the modern era.

In this book, Kim Sexton offers a cultural history of loggias and their role in modernizing late medieval urban life in north and central Italy. In a narrative organized thematically around seismic ideological shifts in republican city-states from circa 1100 to 1400, she demonstrates that the loggia—a compact and refined form of portico—was much more than a convenient shelter on public squares and streets. Not only did loggias offer protection and adornment to both casual gatherings and ceremonial events, but they also functioned as societal tools that facilitated the collective validation of changing mores. Sexton argues that the increasingly monumental loggias commissioned by Italian communes for civic, commercial, and social settings reflects the influence of three secularizing trends: the process of political legitimation in self-governing, proto-capitalistic states, which required innovative, yet prestigious architectural forms to mediate unaccustomed rituals; the development of visual regimes that steered observers toward looking upon and remembering select public activities in a favorable light; and the rise of sophisticated temporal programs of ornament that rivaled ecclesiastical art in rhetorical force. Sexton further argues that both art and architectural historians can benefit from understanding the power of built form to exhibit human interaction, not only because loggias did so in a way that made architecture and spectacle seem indivisible and semi-pictorial, but also because a multi-disciplinary approach allows these highly elaborated spaces of encounter to emerge as key elements in theorizing the late medieval Italian city.

Kim Sexton, associate professor of architectural history at the University of Arkansas, specializes in the study of late medieval and Renaissance architecture in Italy and its intersection with politics and science. She has published articles on medieval loggias and spatial theory as well as medicine and the built environment.

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The Gothic Cathedral in Cracow and the European Architecture Around the Year 1300

Jakub Adamski, Piotr Pajor

The turn of the fourteenth century was a difficult period in the history of late medieval Europe, marked by political instability, endless wars and all kinds of disasters. Yet it saw an extraordinary flourishing of Gothic architecture, marked by constant stylistic transformations that gave rise to a new phenomenon in European architecture: the late Gothic.

This book is devoted to the Gothic cathedral in Cracow (1320–1364), an edifice that perfectly embodies these complex transformations. Although situated on the periphery of the Latin world at the time, it is one of the most stylistically advanced buildings that can be counted as examples of “architecture around 1300”, featuring most of the artistic phenomena that distinguish this period in the history of medieval art. Moreover, this church served as the place of coronation and necropolis for the kings of Poland, and as a national shrine of the patron saint of the Kingdom, Saint Stanislaus, placing it on a par with sacred places such as Reims, Saint-Denis, Westminster, Aachen or Prague.

Jakub Adamski is an art historian and medievalist. After completing his studies in Cracow and Vienna, he was hired in 2012 at the Institute of Art History, University of Warsaw. His main area of research is the history of medieval architecture and sculpture, particularly Gothic, including their style, functions and ideological content.

Piotr Pajor is an art historian at the Institute of History of Art and Culture of the Pontifical University in Cracow. His research interests include medieval architecture and urban planning, especially in terms of function, meaning and social reception, the art of the Mendicant orders, and the use of art as a means of political propaganda in the Middle Ages.

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Practices of Copying in Early Modern European Architecture (1400–1700)

Nele De Raedt, Elizabeth Merrill (eds)

By focusing on practices of copying at the writing table, in the workshop and on the building site, this book opens up new ways to understand how architecture was theorized, studied, conceived and built in the early modern period.

The nine essays are deliberately diverse, spanning from fifteenth-century Italy to eighteenth-century England, from a humanistic tract dedicated to a Spanish noblewoman, to terracotta models for Milanese palace façades. But the contributions are united in their focus on the copy, and more fundamentally, in their common understanding of architecture as an iterative process, the contours of which extend far beyond the building site. In this framework, the authority granted to the architect is mitigated by the recognised involvement of a broad cast of characters: patrons, publishers, designers, craftsmen, workshop assistants and labourers. The studies assembled here elevate the copy from something secondary, derivative to an unrivalled tool for understanding the complex and often uncoded systems by which early modern architecture was realized.

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



During the sixteenth and seventeenth century princes and the high nobility found tomb sculpture an effective means of refashioning their identity and promoting their interests in a rapidly changing society. Enormous funds were spent on these monuments, either by the occupants of by their heirs, for whom the sepulchers became a generalized marker of family status. Epitaphs were also fashioned of words, penned in ink and published as well as engraved in stone. Poetical tributes and eulogies to rulers gave them another type of public persona. This venue was particularly important as the role of the nobility changed in Europe from a primarily military class serving their liege lord in battle to a group charged with the administration of territories within a royal or imperial realm. Traditional coats of arms were still featured. And military achievements might be represented in astonishingly 'realistic' detail. Yet intellectual learning and an awareness of cultural and aesthetic trends in the wider European sphere also became important elements of these monuments.

These papers will explore the ways tombs and epitaphs helped establish a viable image for leading families and facilitated participation in important networks. We will discuss the ways in which these works took part in the debates fostered by the Reformation and the Catholic response. We will examine how adherence to different religions was reflected and often advocated in tomb sculpture and written memorials.


Historians of the late medieval and early modern period have created an antithesis between spiritual (inward) and physical (outward) devotion, branding the latter as superficial, ritualistic and mechanistic. More generally, from the first Protestant historians to Max Weber and his followers, the Reformation has come to be represented as the classic watershed between material, magical devotion and spiritual, rational belief. In a similar vein, art historians have opposed the notion of the medieval cult image, material and functional, to the early modern work of art, subject to aesthetic regard. Yet, does it make sense to distinguish between late medieval and early modern religious culture, given the fact that the definitions and boundaries of these periods are notoriously problematic and considerably overlap?

This volume shows how in early modern Europe religious ideas and practice were realized through interaction with objects that were both functional and aesthetic and how the presence of sculptures, paintings, books, and church furniture—their visibility, tactility, and materiality—helped form attitudes toward devotion, sacred history, and salvation.

Ethan Matt Kavaler is Professor of Art History at the University of Toronto and Director of the Centre for Reformation and Renaissance Studies.



Ilona Katzew is curator and department head of Latin American art at the Los Angeles County Museum of Art, where she built the museum's notable collection of Latin American art. Widely recognized as a leading curator and scholar in her field, she has been awarded numerous grants and prizes for her publications and exhibitions.

Rachel Kaplan is associate curator of Latin American art at LACMA. She received her PhD from the Institute of Fine Arts, New York University in 2015.



Holbein was immersed in the multi-faceted world of Renaissance *ingenium* or 'wit', which could mean innate talent, mental acuity, generative capacity, and a person's unique nature. In dialogue with witty patrons such as Desiderius Erasmus and Thomas More, Holbein advanced an ingenious kind of artmaking characterised by visual jokes, puns, and internal contradictions. Responding to humanism's literary conceits with an inventive pictorial language, he upended conventional assumptions about naturalism and the status of painting to assert the worth of an autonomous artistic intelligence.


This volume is an oddity in the *Corpus Rubenianum*. Rather than being devoted to one particular project, or category of subject, it presents what at first sight might appear a miscellany of drawings. The works discussed here are indeed united only in the circumstance that they have proved difficult to associate directly with any particular painting or project undertaken by Rubens – and, for the most part, they remain so. Many of these 'unrelated' sheets have been relegated to the margins of Rubens scholarship as a result of their ambiguous status, whether because of uncertainties regarding their attribution, their subject-matter or their function (or all three).

Given the nature of the drawings catalogued here, many of which resist iconographic classification, the decision has been made to order the items chronologically, so that they can be seen at least in relation to Rubens's stylistic development.

The present publication is essentially a compilation based on the current state of research on individual items. At the same time it introduces new perspectives on, and suggests a few solutions to, some old problems, as well as shedding light on aspects of Rubens's work that have been largely, and sometimes unjustly, overlooked.


This volume explores the pivotal role of doubt in understanding the work of Peter Paul Rubens. Focusing on his easel paintings from the 1610s, this book argues that Rubens engaged with the era's most pressing intellectual debates without resorting to overt dogma. His works served as open-ended invitations, encouraging viewers to grapple with complex issues of religion, art, and philosophy, offering no definitive answers but instead providing space for personal reflection and recalibration. In contrast to the more direct, polemical writings of his contemporaries, Rubens subtly used his compositional mastery to question the very nature of art—its visual and tactile properties—while navigating the tensions between idolatry and iconoclasm. Rather than aligning with one side of these heated debates, Rubens' paintings proposed a nuanced middle ground, engaging with the ontological questions of his day and affirming the enduring value of painting itself.

Additionally, this book addresses a significant gap in Rubens scholarship: the almost total absence of Dutch-language sources in the existing literature. By examining these overlooked materials, it reveals a paradigmatic shift in Rubens' artistic approach, one that was deeply informed by the intellectual climate of the Netherlands.

Koenraad Jonckheere is a professor of Northern Renaissance and Baroque Art at Ghent University. His published works include *The Auction of King William's Paintings*, *Adriaen Thomasz. Key and Willem Key*, *Antwerp Art after Iconoclasm*, *Another History of Art and Instagrammable*. He authored several parts of the *Corpus Rubenianum Ludwig Burchard*.







This book inaugurates a planned series focusing on Toro Muerto, the largest rock art site in South America. Located in Peru's Arequipa region, Toro Muerto covers approximately 50 km², with the densest concentration of nearly 2500 volcanic boulders engraved with petroglyphs contained within its central 10 km². Known since the 1950s, the site was nevertheless only partially recorded, and earlier documentation was often incomplete or inaccurate. Since 2015, a team of Polish researchers from the University of Warsaw, working in collaboration with Peruvian specialists, has undertaken a systematic programme of documentation; the results are presented here for the first time.

Lavishly illustrated and published in both English and Spanish, this volume functions as both a catalogue and a typology of Toro Muerto's geometric, zoomorphic, and anthropomorphic motifs. It presents the first high-resolution digital record of the site, featuring nearly 50 motif types, almost 700 photographs, and 5500 drawings. With an unprecedented level of detail, the book provides a solid foundation for future iconographic and archaeological research, offering new insights into the symbolic and ritual significance of one of the world's most impressive rock art complexes.



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



Her research interests include issues related to the Subneolithic communities from their western branch, identified with hunter-gatherers group making pottery. She conducts extensive research on the networking, connections and transformations of these communities and their relations with the Neolithic agrarian cultures.


The Iron Age Pottery from Tell Atchana / Ancient Alalakh A Typological and Functional Analysis

Tell Atchana, ancient Alalakh, lies in the Amuq Valley in modern Hatay, southern Türkiye. Long thought to have been abandoned by the end of the Late Bronze Age, recent excavations reveal partial Iron Age occupation, prompting a reassessment of the site's chronology. This book discusses the Iron Age occupation on the site, presenting detailed stratigraphic data and a morphological analysis of the pottery assemblage from the excavated square to establish a relative chronological framework. It also examines the assemblage functionally to identify changes or continuities in habits and actions across the Late Bronze to Iron Age transition and within the Iron Age itself. Through this approach, the study sheds new light on the nature and dynamics of Iron Age I occupation at Tell Atchana.

Dr. Mariacarmela Montesanto is a postdoctoral researcher at the University of Florence, specializing in the archaeology of southwest Asia and the eastern Mediterranean. Her research focuses on Iron Age ceramics, cultural interactions, and landscape archaeology. She has conducted fieldwork in Syria, Türkiye, and the UK, and collaborates on digital heritage projects involving GIS, remote sensing, and 3D documentation.

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
Housing the Ancestors Courtyard Palaces of the Middle Bronze Age Southern Levant

Holly Winter

Debate has surrounded the south Levantine Middle Bronze Age (MBA) Courtyard Palace form since their first discovery in the early twentieth century. Traditional views of the MBA Courtyard Palace were seen through the lens of renewed urban life at the beginning of the MBA, and these monumental constructions were interpreted as central administrative and redistributive institutions. This volume challenges established narratives through a detailed re-analysis of key sites such as Tell el-'Ajjul, Megiddo, and Shechem, and an investigation of several new structures from sites such as Pella and Deir 'Alla. From this study, investigations reveal an absence of administrative and storage paraphernalia from within the structures, and instead an abundance of burials and other materials arguably to be associated with funerary rituals.

Holly Winter is a Near Eastern archaeologist with more than ten years' field experience across the Middle East, and has researched and lectured in the Middle East, Europe, the UK, the United States and Australia. She completed her PhD on Bronze Age monumental funerary architecture at the University of Sydney in 2023. Her interests centre on the Bronze Age Near East, and include architectural history, funerary rites and burial customs, urbanism and the creation of cities, and trade and international relations. Presently, she is employed as a postdoctoral researcher at the University of Sydney.

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

For over 250 years, the kingdom stood as the most powerful political and cultural force across a vast territory, and helped to shape the cultural heritage of territories in Türkiye, Iran, and the South Caucasus. Nonetheless, research into Urartu has long remained regional. This two-volume set offers a comprehensive evaluation of studies related to the Urartian Kingdom and its culture. Focusing both on the Urartian heartlands and beyond, and the territories into which the kingdom expanded, the chapters presented here break new ground in our understanding of the region.





This monograph offers a groundbreaking perspective on prehistoric metrology by introducing the concept of portioning systems as a precursor to weighing and the balance scale. Drawing on archaeological evidence from the Near East and Europe, it develops a holistic framework for understanding independent phases of metrological development across prehistoric societies more broadly. At its core lies a fundamental question: were many of the artefacts considered to have functioned as measure of metal in the Copper and Bronze Ages, among them ingots, bars, and *aes formatum*, actually measured and perceived of in terms of weight? Taking this question as its starting point, the book traces the intellectual journey toward the concept of weight as a pivotal threshold between tangible, anthropomorphic measures and abstract numerical thinking. By identifying and analyzing previously overlooked portioning systems, this study fills a critical gap in archaeological interpretation, offering a comprehensive account of how number and measure evolved in prehistory.

Aleksander Dzbyński was born in 1972 in Warsaw and studied Prehistoric Archaeology, Anthropology and Ancient Art History at universities in Warsaw, Basle and Freiburg. He received his PhD degree from the University of Basle in 2004. He worked as a Senior Lecturer in Archaeology at the University of Rzeszów and at the University of Zürich. He is currently working as a Privatdozent at the University of Zürich and a full time Associate Professor at Warsaw University, where he teaches prehistoric archaeology and archaeological methods and theories.



This volume redefines our understanding of Sudan's Meroitic state, one of northeast Africa's most intriguing ancient civilizations. Motivated by the need to challenge dominant paradigms, it shifts the focus from elite narratives and urban centres to the often-overlooked rural perspectives that shaped the state's development and collapse. Drawing on years of archaeological fieldwork, the book examines socio-political dynamics on the western frontier, where local communities retained cultural autonomy and limited engagement with Meroitic institutions. The absence of temples, burials, and ritual items in these areas signals weak integration, while control of neglected trade routes during northern economic decline fostered local wealth and power. Similar patterns in the eastern hinterland underscore the fragmented nature of the state. This disengagement proved critical, as failure to unite against the Aksumite threat contributed to Meroe's demise. Combining data-driven studies with interdisciplinary approaches, this groundbreaking work, written from an African perspective, offers fresh insights into rural agency, economic networks, and the complex interplay of power within the Meroitic world.

Mohamed Ali is an assistant professor of archaeology at the International University of Africa, Sudan, and is currently a visiting associate professor at The Africa Institute, Global Studies University, UAE. He is known for his profound contributions to the understanding of ancient civilizations in northeast Africa, Sudan. His academic journey commenced at Dongola University in Sudan, and he pursued his studies and obtained a PhD degree in 2016 from the University of California, Santa Barbara, USA.


The book focuses on the colour blue due to its pre-eminence in the material record and its powerful symbolism in the ancient Egyptian and Sudanese cultures.

Initially sourced in the mineral world, with stones of various shades being collected and used for personal ornamentation, and later from dye plants — whose blue hues required complex extraction — blue became a symbol of prestige and innovation. Since blue is relatively rare in its raw natural form, synthetic methods of making blue were developed early on, leading to the creation of the colour through crafts like faience, glassmaking, and pigment production. Made and used in different ways, and invested with many meanings, the colour blue became omnipresent in material culture and architecture.

This volume is a collaborative anthology exploring the significance of blue in ancient Egypt and Sudan. It brings together experts from diverse fields — art history, archaeology, linguistics, textile and leather studies, conservation, and heritage science — to examine the Nile Valley's material world through a 'blue lens'. The book investigates the cultural, technological, and symbolic dimensions of blue, tracing how people discovered, imitated, dyed, painted, carved, and experienced the colour. 


Banqueting *tesserae* — small, moulded terracotta tokens — were used in the religious sphere of Palmyra in the first three centuries AD, conveying a vivid iconographic language that underpinned sacral banquets held in the city's sanctuaries and banqueting halls. Found today in those locations, these artefacts offer a rare glimpse into the overwhelmingly rich ritual and social lives of Palmyrene society.

This book and corpus provides the first comprehensive revision to the study of banqueting tokens since the 1955 publication *Recueil des tessères de Palmyre*, which catalogued 1132 types. Building on that foundational work, this publication updates the original corpus with 168 newly identified *tesserae* types, including numerous previously unpublished examples from the Palmyra Museum and a private collection in Damascus. Each new type is presented with detailed descriptions of motifs and inscriptions.

The book examines the rich iconographic and epigraphic landscape of *tesserae*, which feature depictions of priests, deities, animals, and symbolic imagery, while also casting light on some of the individuals who financed these feasts. With extensive indices on the iconography and epigraphy of the new types, as well as a translation of the indices from the *Recueil des tessères de Palmyre*, this new corpus presents a comprehensive overview and systematic study of this overlooked yet revealing class of material culture, which provides a unique source for our understanding of Palmyrene religious life.







Producing the City-State Production and Power in Medieval Lucca

Taylor Zaneri

This book examines rural producers as active agents in the economic and political transformations of medieval Lucca, Italy, between 1000 and 1300. It challenges traditional top-down narratives of state formation by foregrounding the choices and agency of non-elites. Rather than treating commercial growth, urban expansion, and regional integration as processes driven solely by urban authorities and elites, the study argues that these developments were made possible in part by a transformation of the rural economy and the choices of rural producers. It suggests that rural cultivators altered their agricultural and landscape choices to increase participation in commercial exchange, particularly with the city of Lucca. While these decisions were shaped by structural constraints, they would have involved the conscious participation of rural communities.


Archaeological in focus, the study employs GIS-based agricultural suitability modelling to analyze landscape use and settlement shifts in the hinterland of Lucca. The locations of more than 400 churches are used as a proxy for rural settlements. Over the analysis period, the results demonstrate increased agricultural specialization and the growing importance of commodities such as wine and olive oil, alongside shifts toward more commercially connected landscapes. This book argues that these changes were not merely imposed by urban authorities but reflected deliberate decisions by rural actors themselves, underscoring their role as integral participants in medieval socio-political change.

Taylor Zaneri is a medieval archaeologist specializing in GIS and zooarchaeology. She is a postdoctoral researcher at the University of Antwerp.


Over the course of China's long history, almost one-third of its dynastic houses has been founded by nomads. Traditionally, the period between the Han and the Tang (4th–7th centuries CE) has been considered 400 hundred years of chaos, characterized by civil strife and "barbarian" (i.e., nomadic) invasions. The ability to evaluate the importance of various nomadic groups' contributions was hampered by limited excavated materials. Now, however, a substantial amount of new material has emerged in northern China, specifically in the Inner Mongolia Autonomous Region.

In the fourth century, the nomadic Xianbei emerged in northeastern Inner Mongolia to dominate other tribal groups, and eventually invaded northern China to rule as the Northern Wei dynasty (386–535). Despite their importance in Chinese history, the Xianbei remain little-known today, especially in the West. A major source for Xianbei history and culture, as well as for that of other nomadic groups, has been filtered through the Chinese dynastic texts, which are acknowledged as biased.

This volume offers insights into the diverse nomadic cultures that form the background to Xianbei rule in Pingcheng (modern Datong, Shanxi province), the first major capital established in China built near the northern border close to their homeland.






This volume explores the institutional and economic aspects of women's monasticism in Late Antiquity, which are the most difficult to discern solely based on literature aimed at creating models of behaviour and rules of spiritual life. Some reflections, however, can help our discussion. The exhortation to female sexual continence, exalting in women the inclination to live in total renunciation of material goods and sex, encouraged their exclusion from the hierarchies. We need to understand whether it became central in Christian preaching and treatises at a particular time because, whether effective or not in its outcomes, it allowed the Church to absorb much of the wealth of women who had been won over to that ideal of a Christianity of excellence.

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

This edited volume reassesses Epirus, a region long dismissed as peripheral within the Greco-Roman world. Moving beyond narratives of decline after 167 BC, the volume draws on archaeological and historical evidence to explore how the region was transformed, adapted and integrated into Roman economic structures.

The chapters investigate themes including the development of settlements and fortified centres before the Roman conquest, and the subsequent restructuring of rural territories through land division and the exploitation of agricultural and pastoral resources. They also examine the emergence of *villae rusticae* and large agricultural estates, and the foundation of Nicopolis as a dominant urban and economic hub. Case studies address trade and monetary circulation, shifting patterns of rural investment, and, in some areas, the resilience of inland and coastal economies. Further contributions draw on material culture, including mosaics, and on epigraphic evidence, while also developing spatial approaches to rural connectivity and widening the perspective through comparative discussion beyond the region.

Taken together, the volume demonstrates that Epirus was defined not by marginality within the Roman world, but by the interaction of its people and landscape, where pastoral and agricultural traditions were reconfigured within the wider economic systems of the Roman Mediterranean.

Il peut sembler étrange que la Dacie romaine ait contribué à une meilleure connaissance de la société palmyrénienne. Cela remonte aux circonstances dans lesquelles cette province et son *limes* ont été créés. Tout d'abord, on y a apporté, selon Eutrope, des habitants *ex toto orbe Romano*. Ensuite, afin de défendre la frontière ouest, Hadrien y a envoyé un important contingent de *Palmyreni sagittarii*, répartis en trois vexillations. Au début du règne de Marc Aurèle et Lucius Verus, les vexillations ont été réorganisées en *numeri*. Ces *numeri Palmyrenorum* étaient stationnés dans les camps de Tibiscum, Porolissum et O(---), une localité difficile à identifier. Des communautés palmyréniennes ont pris naissance auprès des camps et dans plusieurs autres localités. De nouveaux éléments venus de Palmyre s'y sont ajoutés. Dans un milieu romain prépondérant, ces communautés ont conservé non seulement leurs traditions guerrières, mais aussi leur religion, leurs noms et leur langue. Parmi les plus de cent inscriptions de Dacie en rapport avec les Palmyréniens, six sont écrites en araméen. La dualité religieuse typique de Palmyre est devenue en Dacie une dualité entre Bêl, le *deus Palmyrenus*, et Malakbêl, devenu un *Sol invictus*. Les Palmyréniens, anciens militaires ou descendants de ceux-ci, se sont intégrés aux structures romaines, atteignant le *décurionat*, le *pontificat* et le *duumvirat* dans les villes, ce qui signifie qu'ils étaient parfaitement romanisés sur le plan politique.





En considérant simultanément les permanences et les ruptures, il aboutit à une modélisation de la christianisation, s'éloignant de l'idée d'une conversion en table rase, pour proposer celle d'un dédoublement rituel où chaque geste ancien demeure à côté d'un nouveau geste chrétien et tente d'en éclairer analysant le rite dans ses fonctions religieuses et anthropologiques premières – faire passer le mort, créer les conditions d'un dialogue récurrent entre morts et vivants, *faire mourir le mort en soi* et mesure en même temps l'action du rite au sein des équilibres sociaux, laissant l'agentivité collective et la parole aux femmes, groupe dont la parole publique est, dans la marche sociale normale, rendue inaudible. Le rituel funéraire fonctionne ainsi comme un moment de *communitas* et d'inversion des hiérarchies sociales, allégeant un temps les tensions de la société dans son état structuré.

Hélène Bernier-Farella est Maître de Conférences en histoire grecque à Cyu (Cergy). Chercheuse au laboratoire Héritages (Umr 9022), elle s'intéresse aux inventions et aux mécanismes du fait rituel, sur des terrains antiques comme contemporains.



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



Le présent ouvrage comprend une étude de la tradition manuscrite de ces textes, une recherche sur leurs auteurs, leurs mécènes et leurs lecteurs ainsi qu'une analyse des stratégies de réécriture élaborées pour recomposer le portrait d'Alexandre et intégrer sa vie dans une histoire universelle.

Elena Koroleva est maître de conférences en langue et littérature françaises médiévales à l'Université Littoral Côte d'Opale (UR 4030 HLLI). Ses travaux portent sur la réception de l'Antiquité et l'historiographie de la fin du Moyen Âge et, plus récemment, sur la littérature didactique des XIII^e-XV^e siècles.


Ce volume réunit les introductions à trois monographies de Franz Cumont touchant à des thématiques assez proches. Dans *After Life in Roman Paganism*, paru en 1922, Cumont analyse les conceptions de l'au-delà et de la vie après la mort dans le polythéisme du monde romain. Le cœur de sa théorie est que la croyance en l'immortalité céleste, se diffusant dans le monde romain aux premiers siècles de notre ère, résulte de l'interaction entre deux influences d'origine distincte, mais convergentes : la philosophie grecque (stoïcisme, pythagorisme et platonisme) et les « religions orientales ». La seconde introduction concerne *L'Égypte des astrologues*, paru en 1937. Pour Cumont, l'astrologie aurait exercé une fonction d'intermédiaire entre les religions païennes et le monothéisme, donnant naissance à une religion, voire un mysticisme astral. À la suite du *Liber Hermetis* de Gundel, paru en 1936, il approfondit la tradition astrologique grecque de l'Égypte hellénistique, où circulèrent conceptions et croyances sur le destin des hommes en lien avec les mouvements des astres. En appendice, quatorze lettres adressées par Cumont à la jeune Claire Préaux en 1947 éclairent un projet de réédition de *L'Égypte des astrologues*, qui ne vit jamais le jour. Enfin, la troisième introduction est consacrée aux *Mages hellénisés*. En compagnie de Joseph Bidez, Cumont publia en 1938 deux tomes dont la gestation remonte aux années 20 et 30. Les deux auteurs partageaient un intérêt profond pour la pensée scientifique et religieuse d'origine « chaldéenne », pionnière et curieuse, et pour sa réception dans le monde gréco-romain. C'est autour de figures de passeurs, comme Zoroastre, que se cristallise leur entreprise : ils traquent les traces de leur pensée chez les auteurs grecs, latins, syriaques et arméniens, et mettent en valeur tout un pan d'histoire intellectuelle et interculturelle.

Franz Cumont (1868-1947) est un historien des religions dont le rayonnement scientifique a été immense.



Religious spaces in Antiquity could be urban (located in a densely populated area), suburban (within a day's walk of the city), or even extra-urban (located far outside the city walls, and away from the hustle of densely populated areas). They also served very different purposes, with urban sanctuaries often serving local socio-political dynamics, while extra-urban spaces were often founded to allow meditation — or for the exercise of political control over a particular territory. But while the importance of different religious spaces has long been known, up to now, very little attention has been paid to the activities of women and children within these religious spaces. This volume aims to investigate the role that these actors played in Antiquity, both in urban and non-urban sanctuaries and in funerary contexts, in order to see how they fitted into this sacred environment, and in turn, how such sanctuaries were shaped by their presence. Different chapters within the volume explore key questions such as: can religious experiences shape urban landscapes? can urban space influence religious experiences and activities? and what role did women and children play in shaping and linking religious activities and spaces? The result is a far-reaching volume that seeks to recognize the hitherto unrecognized role of women and children in shaping the social, economic, sacred, and even political landscapes of sacred spaces.





Sincero Mantelli, specializzato in storia della Chiesa e letteratura cristiana antica, ha conseguito il dottorato di ricerca con una tesi di Filologia patristica. La sua ricerca verte principalmente sull'esegesi dei Padri della Chiesa, con particolare attenzione all'opera di Girolamo. The oldest treatise on the Dominican Observant Reform by one of the most prominent representatives of the Prague milieu at the end of the 14th century.

Henry Bitterfeld's *De formatione et reformatione Ordinis Fratrum Praedicatorum* was the first work of its kind written in support of the Observant Reform of the Dominican Order, which took off in the late fourteenth century. It was probably composed around 1388-1389 at the request of the Order's Master General, Raymond of Capua, who formally launched the reform in 1390.

The treatise is organized into three parts: first, the principles of religious life in general; second, the causes of the crisis within the Order of Preachers; and third, the remedies by which it might be resolved. It concludes with a commentary on the prologue to the Dominican Constitutions.

Bitterfeld's work survives in four manuscript copies, along with three distinct medieval abridgements. Taken together, these testify not only to the reception of the text itself but also to the spread of Observant Reform ideals both within and beyond the Dominican Order.


Henry Bitterfeld was a Dominican friar active around the turn of the fourteenth century. He spent most of his life in Prague, where he maintained close ties with the university, which had by then become one of Europe's leading intellectual centers. Bitterfeld authored numerous theological works that circulated widely across the continent, and he participated in the Church reform movement alongside Archbishop John of Jenstein of Prague.

Anna Zajchowska-Bołtromiuk is a medieval historian at the Polish Academy of Sciences whose research focuses on mendicant orders, preaching, and ecclesiastical reform.

Anna Ledzińska is a philologist at the Institute of Polish Language, Polish Academy of Sciences, specializing in medieval Latin lexicography and text editing.



Osée, premier des Douze, dernier pour Jérôme : une exégèse entre refus du littéral et quête du sens - et un bel exercice de critique textuelle.

Dans la Bible hébraïque comme dans la Bible grecque, Osée est le premier des Douze prophètes. Ce n'est pas lui, cependant, que Jérôme a pris en main le premier, quand il a entrepris de commenter l'ensemble du corpus prophétique de l'Ancien Testament; il figure, au contraire, parmi les derniers qu'il a abordés, à la fin de l'année 406, avant de s'attaquer aux grands prophètes. La raison n'en est pas seulement qu'Osée est le plus long des Douze; il lui posait aussi un problème sur lequel il s'explique longuement dans sa préface. D'entrée de jeu, le Seigneur intime au prophète l'ordre de prendre pour femme une prostituée, puis une autre – ou la même – adultère. Pour les prédécesseurs de Jérôme, tels Irénée ou Hilaire, cela ne faisait pas difficulté. Jérôme, en revanche, répugne invinciblement à l'idée que Dieu puisse cautionner ainsi des comportements immoraux. Contrairement au principe constamment réaffirmé que l'interprétation spirituelle doit s'appuyer sur le fondement de l'histoire, il évacue dans le commentaire des trois premiers chapitres le sens littéral et propose là une lecture purement allégorique du texte sacré. Cette exégèse hors sol contraste avec celle des chapitres suivants où, conformément à la manière habituelle de Jérôme, les oracles du prophète sont régulièrement mis en rapport avec les faits rapportés dans les livres des Rois. La nouvelle édition se base sur un choix de quatorze manuscrits. Parmi les commentaires hiéronymiens des Douze prophètes, du point de vue de l'histoire du texte, chaque cas est particulier. Dans celui d'Osée, les manuscrits carolingiens descendent tous de deux archétypes bourrés de fautes, eux-mêmes tributaires d'un hyperarchétype où elles étaient déjà nombreuses. La leçon originale doit être souvent cherchée dans des manuscrits plus tardifs, qui présentent alors, outre des fautes propres et des variantes de révision intempêtes, le défaut d'être tous plus ou moins contaminés. C'est un bel exercice de critique textuelle.

Édition des versions syriaques des trois Discours sur la Paix de Grégoire de Nazianze, dans l'ordre Or. 6 (De pace I), Or. 23 (De pace II) et Or. 22 (De pace III), ainsi que du Discours De dogmate (Or. 20) et de l'éloge d'Athanase (Or. 21).

Les trois Discours sur la Paix (Or. 6, 23, 22) sont transmis par six témoins de la version récente (S2). L'éloge d'Athanase (Or. 21) est attesté par un témoin de la version moyenne (Sm) et par les mêmes six témoins de S2. Le Discours De dogmate (Or. 20) présente une configuration idéale: un témoin de la version ancienne (S1), un témoin de la version moyenne et deux témoins de la version récente; dans ce dernier cas, on saisit sur le vif comment un même texte grec est traduit et revu sur trois générations.

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
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

Théodore Abû Qurra, évêque melkite de Harrân († ca 830), fut un célèbre controversiste défenseur de la foi chrétienne face aux juifs et aux musulmans et du dogme chalcédonien vis-à-vis des chrétiens d'obédience nestorienne et monophysite. Outre un corpus arabe, la tradition manuscrite nous a transmis un ensemble de textes grecs de sujet divers, allant de la philosophie à l'apologétique, dont on offre ici l'édition.

Si on la compare avec sa production antimusulmane, la production antihérétique de Théodore Abû Qurra demeure moins connue, faute d'éditions scientifiques modernes. La quasi-totalité des textes, en effet, se lisent encore dans la *Patrologia Graeca* de Migne. Le présent travail fournit l'édition critique des plusieurs opuscules grecs attribués à l'auteur, la faisant précéder d'une introduction biographique et d'une étude des codex et de la tradition manuscrite. Outre des textes déjà imprimés dans la *PG*, le lecteur trouvera aussi l'édition de trois opuscules jusqu'ici inédits.

Pietro D'Agostino a étudié la philologie classique et byzantine aux universités de Padoue, de Paris - Sorbonne et de Louvain (KU Leuven). Ses principaux domaines de recherche sont la théologie byzantine, la littérature de pèlerinage et la littérature arabe chrétienne. Il est actuellement le secrétaire de rédaction de la Société des Bollandistes (Bruxelles).

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Jerome of Stridon

The Vigilantius Dossier*Against Vigilantius and Related Works*

Amy H. Oh (trans.)

This volume brings together Jerome's polemical writings against Vigilantius and presents them in accessible, annotated English translations: *Against Vigilantius*, *Letter 61*, and *Letter 109*.

When Jerome begins *Against Vigilantius* with the claim that "many monsters have been produced in the world," he casts the Gallic *presbyter* Vigilantius as an aberration who threatened cherished Christian practices. Vigilantius had challenged the theological legitimacy of celibacy, relic veneration, nocturnal vigils, and ascetic rigor, and he further provoked Jerome's ire by accusing him of heresy. Their dispute, traceable from 395 to 406 CE, reveals a decade-long intellectual entanglement that illuminates key debates in the formative period of Western Christianity.

Through close engagement with Jerome's quoted excerpts from Vigilantius' now-lost "little pamphlet," this volume reconstructs the contours of a controversy that would shape later medieval doctrine and devotional culture. By presenting these texts together and situating them within their broader historical and literary contexts, the volume provides scholars and students of Late Antiquity with fresh insights into two influential yet deeply antagonistic figures whose disagreements anticipated enduring questions about authority, orthodoxy, and the boundaries of Christian practice.

The translations include marginal references to the critical editions of the Latin texts on which they are based (*Corpus Christianorum, Series Latina*, vol. 79C; *Corpus Scriptorum Ecclesiasticorum Latinorum*, vol. 54 and 55). The volume offers an extensive introduction, clarifying notes accompanying the translations, as well as a commentary.

Amy Oh received her Ph.D. from the University of Illinois at Urbana-Champaign and is currently Assistant Professor of Classics at Skidmore College in Saratoga Springs, New York. Her research focuses on later Latin literature and early Christianity.



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The Discovery of the Individual

Post-Chalcedonian Christological Debates and the Dawn of Scholasticism in Early-Byzantine Thought



In the central chapters of this book, Marcin Podbielski and Anna Zhyrkova examine the work of John the Grammarian, Leontius of Byzantium, and Leontius of Jerusalem, showing how, in their writings, a philosophical innovation only associated significantly later with Medieval Latin discourse was brought into existence and clearly formulated: the discovery of the individual, and of the problem of individuation. This discovery, expressed in terms of a radically existential conceptualization of the hypostasis of Christ, as well as of hypostases of created beings, is discussed in counterpoint to the proposals of John Philoponus and Boethius, and also as synthesized, codified and preserved by Maximus the Confessor and John Damascene.

Such a diverse group of five early-Byzantine authors, animated by a shared concern to preserve and clarify the Christological doctrine of Chalcedon, resorted to speculative philosophy to create a conceptual vehicle for the Christian doctrine of there being one Christ both truly divine and truly human. Their notion of 'hypostasis' came to designate the subject of natures, existent in its own right and exhibiting all the hallmarks of individuality, found in later Medieval investigations. An inquiry into the philosophical and theological background of this discovery, including a comprehensive historical reconstruction of the concept of hypostasis, makes it possible to show the philosophical and theological novelty of the authors studied, which consists also in their creating a properly Christian approach to philosophical speculation that foreshadows Scholasticism and can be considered a kind of Proto-Scholasticism. The book concludes with an exploration of the philosophical import of the discovery and the model of Christian philosophy it furnishes.

Anna Zhyrkova specializes in Patristic philosophy and Neoplatonic logic, while Marcin Podbielski focuses on Ancient philosophy. Both work in the Department of Philosophy at the Jesuit University Ignatianum in Krakow. This volume originates from the research project The Neo-Chalcedonian Philosophical Paradigm, funded by the National Science Center of Poland.

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Christian Paschal Tables and Their Lunar Cycles from Anatolius to Bede

Daniel Mc Carthy

This is the first comprehensive published account of the evolution of the Christian use of a 19-year lunar cycle to schedule Easter, from Anatolius' introduction of the cycle in the third century to Bede's 532-year continuation of it in the eighth century.

The events of Jesus' Crucifixion and his Resurrection three days later provide the basis for Christians' belief in redemption and an existence after death. Consequently, the celebration of the events of Jesus' Passion represents the most important feast in the Christian calendar, designated Pasch, or Easter in English. The four Gospels correlate the Crucifixion with the Jewish feast of Passover, celebrated at the time of the spring full moon, so initially the Passover full moon determined the approximate date of the Christian celebration. However, as Christianity spread beyond Palestine it became difficult for the dispersed Christian communities to synchronize their celebration of Pasch. In AD 269, Anatolius, bishop of Laodicea in modern Syria, established an accurate 19-year lunar cycle to predict the date of the spring full moon for future years. In circa AD 309, Eusebius, bishop of Caesarea, used Anatolius' 19-year lunar cycle to construct a table to schedule Pasch for the future years. In AD 328 Athanasius, bishop of Alexandria, modified Anatolius' lunar cycle by advancing all nineteen full-moon dates by exactly two days, and this cycle was continued by his episcopal successor, Theophilus. In circa AD 412 the Alexandrian mathematician, Annianus, further modified this cycle by advancing its saltus by three years. Annianus' cycle was quickly adopted by Theophilus' episcopal successor, Cyril, who misrepresented that Annianus' cycle had been authorized by the Council of Nicaea. This was the cycle that prevailed in the Western Church until Pope Gregory reformed the calendar in 1582, and this book comprehensively documents for the first time the evolution of these Paschal cycles.

Daniel Mc Carthy is a Fellow Emeritus and retired Senior Lecturer, Department of Computer Science, Trinity College, Dublin, and has published articles and books dealing with the Paschal computus, chronicles and annals and their chronology, historical astronomical observations, monastic tonsure, mathematical tables, and the Book of Kells.



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

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
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The Book of Judith in the Context of the Greek Literature



The book of Judith has a typically biblical background, as evidenced by the description of the characters, the construction of some scenes, and the message conveyed by the tale. The biblical models are woven together, referring to one another and suggesting a clear Jewish cultural matrix for this book; moreover, the citations from the biblical text confirm this reading. However, many narrative elements are exceptional with respect to this biblical background and rather show significant affinities with Classical and Hellenistic Greek literature. A dense interweaving of biblical motifs and those proper to Greek literature can be observed in the book of Judith. Indeed, the book of Judith has often been approached with priority consideration of the Jewish context in which it would have been conceived. This tendency depended on the fact that for a long time there was no doubt as to the existence of a Hebrew or Aramaic *Vorlage* for this book, despite the absence of any trace of it. In the light of these premises, the present volume aims to analyze the most significant points of contact between the biblical book of Judith and Greek literature. To this end, it gathers literary *topoi* as well as specific vocabulary and particular syntagmas through which one may recognize resonances with Classical and Hellenistic Greek literature. The literary and cultural origins of the author of the book of Judith and its readers are investigated, evaluating the text of Judith as a Hellenistic phenomenon, with reference to language and culture.

Beatrice Perego is a Postdoctoral Fellow at the Faculty of Theology of the University of South Bohemia (České Budějovice). She studied Classics at the State University and the Catholic University of Milan and received her PhD in History of Religions (University of Strasbourg) discussing a thesis on the Book of Judith and its relationships with Greek literature. She is a collaborator of the research group Historical and Theological Lexicon of the Septuagint.



« Donne-moi de quoi faire offrande »

Saint Augustine's *Confessions*... Hasn't everything already been said about this absolute masterwork? And yet, it is still possible, even necessary, to "seize and read" this book, following Augustine's experience, one fine day of 386 that was to change his life. The proposal of this book is straightforward: read the *Confessions* under the guidance of a seminal prayer – "Give me what I will offer you" – which constitutes the maxim of an anthropo-theology based on gift.

Les *Confessions* de saint Augustin... Tout n'a-t-il pas déjà été dit sur le chef-d'œuvre de l'évêque d'Hippone ? Et pourtant, il est encore loisible, voire nécessaire, de « prendre et lire » ce livre, selon l'appel qui changea le destin d'Augustin un beau jour de 386. Sous quel prisme éclairer la beauté « si ancienne et si neuve » de cette confession singulière, récit de conversion enraciné dans l'Écriture, sous le regard d'un Dieu un et trine, « plus intérieur que le plus intime en soi » ? La proposition de ce livre est simple : lire les *Confessions* à l'aune d'une prière séminale – « Donne-moi de quoi te faire offrande » – qui constitue la maxime d'une anthropo-théologie fondée sur le don. Créé par et pour le don : tel est l'homme augustinien, qui sait que tout peut être offert parce que tout est donné – l'existence, le monde, la médiation sacramentelle des Écritures et de l'Eucharistie. Loin du ressentiment paradoxal et si actuel envers le donné, compris comme une limitation du libre choix du sujet, c'est au contraire la proposition d'un « admirable échange », empreint de largesse et de gratitude, qui ouvre une voie vers la *vita beata*.

The study of youth remains a tantalizing prospect in the sciences today, particularly as a means of extending life. Many institutions rely on the flexibility, cheaper labor and creative approaches to problem solving that young people often carry with them into research and professional environments. 
In the fifteenth and sixteenth centuries, the city councils of Hanseatic towns participated lively in the Northern European landscape of diplomacy. Often, it was conflict which lay behind the magistrates' diplomatic activities. Discord among the members of the Hanse, intercity disputes between individual burghers, and large-scale "international" altercations, all required town councils to engage with actors and institutions beyond the town walls.

This book examines how the magistrates of the Hanseatic towns Lübeck and Reval managed such conflicts which often exceeded the formal limits of their own jurisdiction and authority. Through a comparative study of two towns with markedly different access to political power and networks, this book analyses the scope of diplomatic action available to city councils. By placing the diplomacy of municipal governments in the broader frame of European urban political thought and practice, it shows how magistrates combined a flexible conception of the common good with a pragmatic notion of reciprocity to balance their relations to their own citizenry and overlords, as well as to the Hanse and foreign rulers. Furthermore, this book zooms in on practices of diplomacy and processes of negotiation, uncovering the variety of strategies and tactics employed by the councils and their diplomats in written correspondence as well as face-to-face meetings at regional and Hanseatic diets.

Christian Manger received his PhD-degree from the University of Amsterdam in October 2023. Currently, he works as a postdoctoral researcher in the department of Public Law and Governance at Tilburg University where he studies the role of professionals in late medieval towns. He specializes in the political and legal history of late medieval cities and urban institutions, with a particular interest in conflict management and urban diplomacy.

An interdisciplinary book uniquely combining methods and concepts of history, sociology and literary science. The monograph explores the normative idea of a premodern city *as it should be*, namely as the idealized community, politically autonomous entity based upon republican values with its own mythology and also as a strictly symmetrical place being the distinctive feature of the rational human civilisation. Though expressed in numerous urban rituals, symbolic acts, public festivities and urban architecture, the normative concept of the city was above all embedded in written and printed sources.

The book's findings are based upon a spectrum of narrative sources involving urban chronicles, political treatises, panegyrics, family memoirs, descriptions of cities, instructions summarizing principles of good governance, and also the literary genre of utopia. All of them referred to the normative image of a premodern urban community by highlighting the idealized and therefore largely imagined principles of urban republicanism. By covering the period 1450–1800, the monograph explores also the gradual collapse of idealized premodern communities and the rise of modern urban societies. Geographically, research has focused upon cities and towns in peripheries that have been traditionally ignored by the mainstream urban history. The largely "unknown urban Europe" comprises the Bohemian Lands, Polish-Lithuania and Hungary with significant overlaps to German Lands and Austria.

Jaroslav Miller studied history in Olomouc, Budapest and Oxford. He pursued research stays in Canada, the USA, Germany, the United Kingdom and Australia. For 8 years he held the position of the Rector of Palacký University, Olomouc. In 2022 he was appointed the Deputy Minister of Education (Czechia). He writes on urban and intellectual history.

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





The Multiplicity of Scripture The Making of the Antwerp Polyglot Bible

Theodor Dunkelgrün

The Antwerp Polyglot Bible (1568-1573) has long been recognized as one of the most ambitious typographical enterprises of the sixteenth century. Upon completion, it was the most elaborate Bible ever printed, a library of biblical erudition with editions of the ancient Hebrew, Aramaic, Syriac, Greek, and Latin versions together with new scholarly instruments necessary to study and compare them.

The Multiplicity of Scripture is the first book-length study of how the Antwerp Polyglot was made. Combining the history of the book with the history of scholarship and drawing on primary sources from archives and libraries across Europe, it reconstructs the editorial history of Christopher Plantin's masterpiece from within his printing shop. Set in the contexts of fierce biblical controversies in Tridentine Europe and the fraught afterlife of Jewish traditions in post-expulsion Spain, it tells a story of crisis and craftsmanship, of ink-stained proofs in four different alphabets and the extraordinary team of scholars and printers that made this monument of Renaissance printing and scholarly endeavour.

Theodor Dunkelgrün is assistant professor of Jewish History at the University of Antwerp. He was educated at Leiden University and the University of Chicago, where he received his doctorate in 2012 from the Committee on Social Thought. From 2012 to 2023 he held several research fellowships at the University of Cambridge, where he taught for the faculties of History, Divinity, and Classics, and co-founded the Seminar in Early Modern Scholarship and Religion.



Jindřich Marek is an associate professor at Charles University, Faculty of Arts (Prague). He has a long-standing interest in the history of books in the Bohemian lands in the Middle Ages and early modern period.



Que dire donc de neuf sur ces structures éducatives d'Ancien Régime ? Qui plus est : que dire de neuf sur les collèges de la Compagnie de Jésus au XVIII^e siècle, à la tête de 109 collèges ? La singularité de ces établissements est d'avoir été fermés sur décision royale au cours de la décennie 1760. La source principale de cette étude n'est pas un document produit en interne par la Compagnie, mais une trace créée à la demande du pouvoir royal dans un but radical : les procès-verbaux d'inventaire des collèges. Les conditions même de la production de cette trace méritent, aux yeux de la candidate d'être interrogées dans la temporalité (ou plutôt les différentes temporalités adoptées par les parlements qui refusent d'enregistrer à l'unisson les déclarations et édits royaux portant suppression de la Compagnie) et dans la spatialité (avec des jeux d'échelles entre les circonscriptions administratives royales, les provinces jésuites, jusqu'aux différents espaces aménagés dans l'enceinte des établissements). Ces procès-verbaux ont été utilisés dans deux perspectives complémentaires. Ils sont la matière archivistique d'une étude sur l'histoire des collèges au XVIII^e siècle. En outre, ils sont tout aussi intéressants pour le récit qu'il font de l'action des commissaires royaux en charge de ces inventaires. Ressurgissent les éléments que les commissaires ne comprennent pas, et à l'opposé les éléments sur lesquels ils préfèrent insister, en l'absence de grille de lecture imposée par le pouvoir royal ou par les parlements. Enfin, une lecture par l'historienne « à rebours » met en évidence ce que les commissaires disent de la réaction des religieux et de l'agency qui se lit en filigrane, dans cette situation de menace imminente, avec une typologie des pratiques déployées, de façon pragmatique, par les religieux.

Véronique Castagnet-Lars est maître de conférences en histoire moderne à l'Université Toulouse - Jean Jaurès et membre du laboratoire Framespa. Ses recherches se trouvent à la croisée de l'histoire religieuse et de l'histoire de l'éducation sous l'Ancien Régime.

Les biographies sérielles et les galeries de portraits d'hommes et de femmes illustres sont un phénomène caractéristique de l'époque romaine. Les *De uiris illustribus* de Cornélius Népos et de Suétone, dont nous avons perdu la majeure partie, et les collections publiques ou privées de statues de *summi uiri*, que l'archéologie continue de mettre au jour, soulèvent encore de nombreuses questions. Les catalogues se sont ouverts pour donner toujours plus de place aux femmes, aux peuples étrangers, aux minorités religieuses... La tradition romaine des portraits d'hommes et de femmes illustres s'est vue profondément renouvelée dans ses formes visuelles (processions de figures à fresque, galeries de tableaux, séries d'enluminures et de gravures et même jeu de cartes) et littéraires (récits en prose et poèmes néo-latins ou vernaculaires). Le présent ouvrage retrace quelques-unes de ces métamorphoses et révèle, au-delà des perpétuels travestissements et réincarnations des exempla antiques, certaines propriétés constantes des portraits en série de personnages illustres.

Erasmus fühlte sich zu ihm besonders hingezogen: Dies schlägt sich am deutlichsten in den *praefationes* zu den drei Hieronymus-Gesamtausgaben nieder, die er von 1516 bis zu seinem Tod (1536) beim Basler Drucker Froben betreute. Im vorliegenden Band sind diese Vorreden (samt jenen der Frobenschen Ausgabe von 1553) chronologisch ediert, mit kritischem und Similien-Apparat sowie mit historisch-philologischen Anmerkungen versehen. Die Edition ergänzt jene der *praefationes* zu den anderen drei Vätern der lateinischen Kirche (Ambrosius, Augustinus und Gregor der Große), die ebenfalls im humanistischen Basel in der ersten Hälfte des 16. Jh. erschienen sind (*Basilea patristica*, 2019). So bieten die beiden Bände die Textgrundlage für weiterführende Untersuchungen im Rahmen der Patristik, der neulateinischen Literatur und Philologie sowie der frühmodernen Kulturgeschichte an.





This interdisciplinary volume connects multiple scholarly approaches and expands the significance of court studies and its corollary disciplines (such as gender studies, cultural heritage, literary studies, and medical history).

The study of bodies and their various functions, including emotions, sexualities, and health has become a key area of scholarship in recent years, though has until now remained peripheral to court studies. This interdisciplinary volume of essays represents an important intensification of focus, picking up the increased attention paid to the individual bodies that made up premodern royal and princely courts. It focuses on the ways in which the courtly environment shaped the corporeal experiences of everyone involved. Contributors address the physicality of the court in four key categories from across the lifecycle: bodily experiences, identity and emotions; performativity, gendered bodies, and sexuality; health, sickness and disabled bodies, and corpses, the politics of death and memory. These common experiences were not one-size-fits-all, but took on particular political, social, and cultural consequence in the charged atmosphere of the court, which they in turn helped define. This volume therefore offers a new approach to royal and court studies, from a broad chronological and geographical perspective, which will open new lines of research on the physicality of courtly environments and the corporeality of power.





This book is, sadly, a posthumous publication. It is the author's last work and offers a new approach to the study of Peace in early modern Europe. It explores the creations made by artists, poets, composers, and choreographers for festivals performed at court and in the cities of Europe which were specifically designed to make players and spectators aware of the significance of Peace, and to move them to actions which helped to guarantee its duration. Created in the context of war, these festivals were based on a conception of a world made up of harmony and controlled by an interplay between order and disorder. This view of the universe influenced writers in their opinions of political structures and diplomatic strategies for which festivals played an important role. Politics and spectacle are shown here to be mutually reinforcing, for ballets, intermezzi, masquerades, choral performances, and princely entries, while recognizing the potency of war, all sought to establish concord, and to bring civic unity to countries devastated by conflict. In spectacle, the Quest for Peace is complex, frail, yet rich in invention.

Margaret M. McGowan, CBE, FBA, was Research Professor at the University of Sussex. Her research centred on intellectual, cultural, and artistic concerns in early modern Europe. She gave the Leopold Delisle lectures in 2012, was awarded the Wolfson Prize in 2008, a CBE in 1998, and became a Chevalier de l'Ordre des Arts et des Lettres in 2020.

Bona Sforza (1494–1557) was a key figure in the political, diplomatic, and economic life of early modern Europe. The niece of Lucrezia Borgia, she was an economic innovator and reformer and patron of architecture and the arts. Bona was the legitimate heir to the Sforza throne of Milan, Queen Consort of Poland, Duchess of Bari, and Princess of Rossano, and claimant to the crown of the Latin Kingdom of Jerusalem, the latter Italian possessions inherited from her mother in 1524.

This volume brings together studies of diverse aspects of the Queen's activity. 



From the sixteenth century onwards the Spanish Habsburg dynasty developed a complex practice of court ceremonial that was implemented across its network of Reales Sitios (royal palaces, residences, and estates). In parallel, the Spanish Habsburgs amassed a world-renowned collection of sumptuary objects and artworks. Combinations of rituals, spaces and objects were deployed to stage a ceremonial spectacle that foregrounded the monarchy's power and transmitted an idea of regal magnificence. The purpose of this book is to analyse the representation of this idea of regal grandeur. It brings together a range of studies that focus on court ceremony, the Reales Sitios, collecting, and symbolic language as different facets of one and the same phenomenon. The monarchy's lavish, visual, and sensory concept of royal power was also transferred to the uppermost tier of the nobility, those closest to the monarch, and, likewise, this phenomenon was susceptible to the influence exerted by other European courts, especially within the peninsular, yet also at the Habsburg vice-regal courts.

Inmaculada Rodríguez is Professor of History of Art in the Department of History, Geography and Art at the Universitat Jaume I. Her research is focused on the iconography of power, festival culture and ephemeral art in Spain, as well as emblem culture in both Spain and Latin America. She has published widely on these subjects.


The Lutheran rite of 'churching' women after childbirth was long performed across Europe. It marked the liminal end of a woman's cycle of procreation — from pregnancy through to her first months as a new mother. Dating back to ancient Christianity, churching has rarely been studied in depth. Spanning four centuries, this volume offers a compelling case study of how religious practices persist, change, and disappear — and what they reveal about the enduring tensions between gender, ritual, and institutional control. It is a history of women and their everyday lives, but also a history of forgetting, for it centred on the messiness of childbirth — a female world long marginalized in historical narratives.

This book examines the rules imposed on procreative women, whether during pregnancy or in the seclusion of confinement, and shows how churching became a feast day for the married mother, marking her return to church and society after weeks of separation. Unmarried mothers, by contrast, faced public shame and church discipline. These disparities expose how Lutheran society enforced moral boundaries, upheld sexual norms, and regulated procreative women's bodies. Drawing on a wealth of source material — most of it previously unexplored — this book reveals churching at the centre of communal life for centuries. Rooted in Denmark but with far wider resonance, *A Woman's Rite* restores churching to the history of European ritual and gendered religious life.

Mette M. Ahlefeldt-Laurvig is a historian working on the religious, cultural, and social history of women in Denmark and wider Scandinavia, primarily in the early modern period, but with research that extends into the twentieth century. She received her DPhil from the University of Oxford in 2019 and has published in English and Danish on the ritual of churching, marriage, and other historical subjects. She holds an earlier degree in classical music from Denmark.

Combining original qualitative and quantitative sources with innovative digital humanities methodologies, the contributors offer a nuanced analysis of both normative frameworks and everyday practices. The volume situates the household as a central unit of economic activity and social negotiation, revealing how gender shaped access to work, time allocation, and the valuation of labour. Through this interdisciplinary approach, the chapters gathered here provide new insights into the historical construction of wage systems and the lived realities of working-class women in Europe in the eighteenth to early twentieth centuries.

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

How did the Byzantines learn to sing in church? And how can we understand the neumatic signs they used? *The Elements of the Papadike* presents, for the first time, a critical edition of texts and notated exercises designed for elementary training in medieval Byzantine chant. Careful and long-term studies in the rich manuscript tradition have led the researchers of *Monumenta Musicae Byzantinae* to establish a secure chronology of the formation and development of these didactic materials. Likewise, the crystallization of four basic types brings clarity to the entire Papadike tradition that began in the thirteenth century, flourished in the fourteenth and fifteenth centuries, and continued well beyond the Fall of Constantinople.

The edition of the Greek text and Byzantine neumes is accompanied by English parallel translation and transcriptions into modern notation on facing pages. In addition, each element and exercise is accompanied by a running commentary with explanations and bibliographic references for further reading.

Christian Troelsgård is director of *Monumenta Musicae Byzantinae*, associate professor at the University of Copenhagen, and member of the Royal Danish Academy of Sciences and Letters.

Maria Alexandru is member of the *Monumenta Musicae Byzantinae* editorial board, professor, head of department for music studies at the Aristotle University of Thessaloniki, and chair of the study group 'Music of the Christian East and Orient' under the International Musicological Society.





Music and Colonialism in Fascist Italy Identity, Propaganda, and Ethnographic Representation

This book offers the first comprehensive investigation of the role of music within the context of Italian imperial expansion in Africa, with a particular focus on the Fascist period. While Italy's colonial project spanned approximately sixty years, it was during the final decades — under Mussolini's regime — that music emerged as a subtle yet potent instrument of propaganda. Despite its importance, the intersection of Italian music and colonial politics has remained critically underexplored, often eclipsed by postwar narratives that sought to deny or obscure cultural complicity.


Drawing on archival sources, colonial newspapers, Italian and international press, published and unpublished scores, and personal accounts, the book examines four domains of entanglement between music and imperial ideology: the projection of Italian cultural identity in Libya through opera houses and concert programming; the colonial staging of Arab musical and dance traditions to satisfy orientalist appetites; the overlooked field of Italian musical ethnography in colonial settings, marked by flawed methodology and rare sonic documentation; and the creation of propagandistic works endorsing imperial ambitions. Special attention is given to Libya under Governor Italo Balbo, including Radio Tripoli's role in circulating local music, and to compositions by Adriano Lualdi and Alfredo Casella that engaged with imperial themes. These case studies show how music was mobilized to affirm nationalism, legitimize domination, and shape perceptions of the Other. By reintegrating music into the historiography of Italian colonialism, this study reclaims a neglected dimension of twentieth-century culture, challenging enduring silences in both musicological and postcolonial scholarship.

Isabella Abbonizio is a musicologist and classical guitarist who holds a Ph.D. in Musicology from the University of Rome 'Tor Vergata' and a Guitar Diploma from the 'G. B. Martini' Conservatory of Bologna. She is currently a Research Affiliate at New York University's Department of Italian Studies and was previously a Visiting Scholar at NYU's Center of European and Mediterranean Studies.

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

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Sound and Space in Early Modern Valencia c. 1400–c. 1700

During the fifteenth century Valencia was transformed into an impressive urban complex which over the course of time became renowned for its highly developed ceremonial practices involving emblematic buildings and public spaces that shaped and were shaped by a wide variety of sounds: this dynamic and multifaceted relationship between sound and space created the city's identity and characterised the daily life of its inhabitants.

By the later Middle Ages Valencia had become a major urban centre close to the Mediterranean and surrounded by fertile plains. From Jaume I's conquest of the city in 1238, ecclesiastical and civic institutions were founded in rapid succession and built elegant churches and palaces to reflect their permanence and prestige. From at least the time of Francesc Eiximenis (d. 1409), the city's authorities became increasingly aware of the importance of opening new public spaces within the web of narrow streets characteristic of Muslim conurbations in the interest of developing the representation of a Christian civic religion. These spaces, notably those in front of the royal palace, cathedral and Dominican and Franciscan monasteries, quickly established themselves as focal points for urban ritual, especially for the processional activity that marked the liturgical calendar and the devotional practices of confraternities and guilds. Sounds of all kinds shaped and were shaped by the urban complex and were generated by both the festive and non-festive events that, whether recurrent or exceptional, held deep significance for the inhabitants of the city. This interdisciplinary collection of fifteen essays explores the relationship between the sounds and spaces of late medieval and early modern Valencia to gain greater insight into how the city's inhabitants interpreted the soundscape in which they moved and which influenced their daily lives, creating a sense of community – albeit one full of rivalry and conflict – and resulting in a coherent Valencian identity.





Il complète et développe la présentation sommaire de ce fonds décrit dans le septième volume de la présente collection (CMN 7, p. 155-240).


In this volume, twenty-four authors dedicate their chapters to the most important composer-conductors of the nineteenth and twentieth centuries.

Between the nineteenth and twentieth centuries, many great musicians served as both composers and conductors, often conducting their own works or those of other composers. In the nineteenth century, it was common for a talented musician to be a skilled performer (often a pianist or violinist), composer and conductor. Notable figures such as Liszt, Wagner, Mahler and Strauss conducted their own works to promote them and ensure their artistic integrity. Conducting was seen as a natural extension of musical creation rather than a separate career. This was partly because twentieth-century scores required a much higher level of rhythmic precision and clarity of execution, favouring the development of rigorous conducting techniques. In this volume, twenty-four authors dedicate their chapters to the most important composer-conductors of the nineteenth and twentieth centuries, addressing them from various perspectives, including gesture, orchestral repertoire, reception, legacy, reputation, press criticism and their role in promoting new music.

Roberto Illiano is General Secretary of the Centro Studi Opera omnia Luigi Boccherini and President of the Italian National Edition of Muzio Clementi's Complete Works. He is General Editor of the series 'Speculum Musicae' and 'Staging and Dramaturgy: Opera and the Performing Arts' (Brepols Publishers), and has published a variety of writing (edited volumes, articles, editions, and dictionary entries) on 19th- and 20th-century music, in particular on Luigi Dallapiccola and Italian music under Italian fascism.


The edition introduces the reader in the world of music theory developed by Boethius, the most influential theorist of Latin Europe, as explained by John Dunstaple, the foremost English composer of the Late Middle Ages.

European theory of music up to ca.1550, in many respects, presents a history of the reception of Boethius's treatise *De institutione musica* (before 510). The annotations introduced to this treatise by John Dunstaple (d. 1453), eminent composer of the late Middle Ages, add to our knowledge of the English chapter of this history.

The first part of the volume includes the edition of Dunstaple's annotations paralleled with relevant parts of Boethius text and provided with the introduction comprising a detailed information on manuscript Oxford, Corpus Christi College 118 and the study of Dunstaple's hand. They present Dunstaple as a careful and competent reader of Boethius's arguments and a composer well-read in music theory current in his time.



The Beginnings of Opera in Europe


This is the first book-length publication dealing with the different beginnings of opera in its homeland Italy as well as in other parts of Europe.

This is the first book dedicated to the early history of opera in Europe from a comparative perspective. It takes into account not only the diverse beginnings of opera in Italy around 1600 (Florence, Rome, Mantua), but also the mechanisms of reception and adaptation of the new genre outside of Italy in the following decades (in the German-speaking realm, and in the Commonwealth of Poland and Lithuania). Questions of genre and its terminology are discussed as well as the history, function, and contents of librettos and their special linguistic and structural devices. Special attention is paid to issues of performance practice, such as the assignation of certain types of roles to certain types of singers, and staging. In order to broaden this perspective, the influence of Spanish 17th-century spoken drama on the early Venetian opera is explored. Furthermore, the beginnings of regional operatic traditions outside of Italy (such as in Spain and France) play a central role, along with the specifically English concept of 'dramatic opera', and the question of music in spoken drama. In this way, new and fascinating insights can be gained into opera in its initial phase (roughly from 1600 to 1680), including its development and regional styles, its acceptance or rejection, and the critical discourse surrounding the genre.
